

Dr. Lauren Zanussi

Becoming Better Teachers: Principles on How to Create Great Education for Adult Learners

Dr. Lauren Zanussi has lived in Calgary almost all of his life. He is a graduate of the University of Calgary and has degrees in Biochemistry and Medicine. He went on to be trained in Psychiatry and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada.

He is an assistant professor at the University of Calgary where he has run the undergraduate course in psychiatry and medical skills. He has special expertise in communication skills training and is a consultant to other departments to help train their residents as communicators. He has a special interest in the use of technology to augment learning and has been helpful in driving the modernization of medical education at the University of Calgary. He is the twice the recipient of the Allan R. Jones award for innovation in education and twice the recipient of the Michael Tarrant Award for Mentorship in education. He has over two dozen awards for his lecturing at the medical school.

As a Psychiatrist, he has received training in psychiatric complications of medical conditions. He practices in Calgary at the Foothills Hospital. He has an inpatient and outpatient practice, a large portion of which is taken up by people with sleep disorders, liver disease and transplants. He has worked closely with the Canadian Mental Health Commission and the University of Calgary in reducing stigma of mental health in the public and amongst medical practitioners. He is the Acting Medical Director of Psychiatric ER services and is the Site Chief at the Foothills Hospital.

Everything You Ever Wanted to Ask but Were Afraid to Because You Thought You Would Look Racist - Lessons Learned from Working with At-Risk Youth

Participants will be exposed to the work of the Real Me Program, a gang intervention program for 1st and 2nd generation immigrant youth, between the ages of 12-24 years of age, where there is a concern about the youth becoming involved in criminal and or gang activity.

Carolee will provide an overview of a presentation given to a local school where staff asked for assistance in working with their South Sudanese youth and families. The key focus will be what the youth have shared in terms of their experiences with school; what they wished teachers had asked and did not; challenges in the classroom; perceptions of education for youth and families; and finally, how professionals can ask questions that are culturally responsive that enhances and supports life long learning instead of suppressing it.



Anthony You

21st Century Correctional Education

From a background in Technology in Education and Educational Psychology, Anthony will explore theories in Constructionism and Computational Thinking (CT) in ways that will practically evolve correctional classrooms in innovative ways. CT provides a foundation for learners to be more effective in new growing industries and is applicable in many ways outside of computing science. Using CT as a way of defining digital literacy, Anthony will demonstrate how the process involved with CT and coding influences recidivism, learning, and change.

Post Traumatic Growth and Recovery: A Paramedic's View

Natalie will take you on a journey through her recovery from PTSD, addiction, depression and anxiety. As an advanced Care Paramedic, she attended a double-murder call that was part of a satanic ritual where the murderer became her patient. Two years went by and her health spiraled out of control and on the day when she had to testify at the murder trial, she overdosed and became a patient to her colleagues. While being treated at rehabilitation hospitals, Natalie documented her recovery journey on her blog, paramedicnatsmentlahealthjourney.com, which attracted the attention of 6-time Canadian Olympian, and mental health ambassador, Clara Hughes. Clara re-tweeted Natalie's blog which subsequently became a book called, Save-My-Life School: A first responders mental health journey, and has been listed at #2 on Amazon's Hot New Releases. Recovery is possible; Natalie will explain how.

Dr. Hamilton (clinical lead) and Dr. Baxter (medical lead) will describe what modern sex offender treatment looks like and the development of the new innovative Alberta in-custody program. With the closure of the Phoenix Program in Edmonton, there was an exciting opportunity to build a new provincial program from the ground up and one that would work within a correctional setting. While many saw barriers and challenges, the Rocky Mountain program has become inspirational, exciting, and surprising to both staff and program participants.
